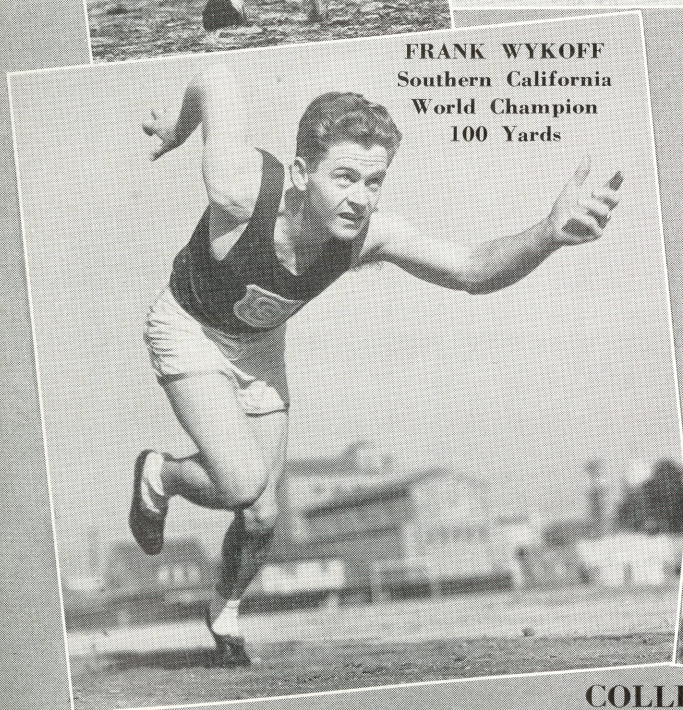

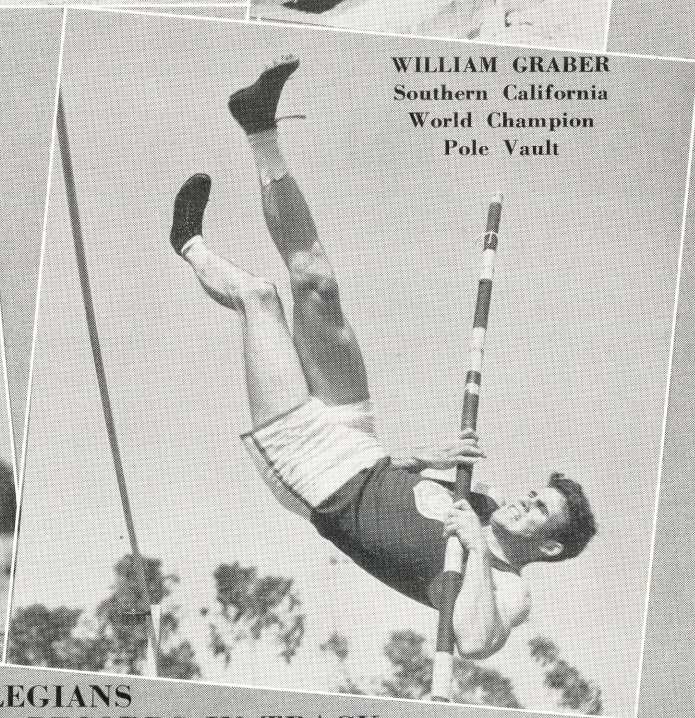

WHO ARE THESE MEN---

THAT COACH THE BIG TEN TRACK TEAMS?



SHERMAN FINGER
Minnesota

SHERMAN W. FINGER, track coach at the University of Minnesota, was born at Oshkosh, Wis., May 4, 1883. He prepared for college at Davenport high school, Davenport, Iowa, and later entered the University of Chicago where he starred in football and track.

As a football player he made his mark at fullback with the late Walter Eckersall, Walter Steffen and Hal Iddings. Eckersall played quarterback, with Steffen

and Iddings at the halves.

After a brilliant record as an athlete at Chicago he was graduated in 1907 and became athletic director at Cornell College, Mt. Vernon, Iowa. He continued at this post until 1924, turning out consistently strong football and track teams while coaching these sports.

Finger's period of service at Cornell was interrupted in 1917 by the World War and he went overseas as athletic director for the Third Army during 1918-19. Later he became coach of the American high jumpers and broad jumpers at the Interallied Games.

Coming to Minnesota in 1924 as head track coach with the title of associate professor in physical education and athletics Coach Finger has developed Gopher cinder squads since that time and also has had charge of cross country and aided with freshman football at various times.

Illness during the past two years has handicapped Mr. Finger considerably but he has carried on with the aid of Clarence Munn, former Western Conference shotput champion who was developed by him from 1929 through 1931. Mr. Finger is a member of A. T. O.

To coach a championship team in his first year as a University coach was the successful record of Don C. Seaton, University of Illi-

nois track coach, who was called back to his alma mater at the beginning of the school year of 1933-1934, to succeed the veteran Illini coach, Harry Gill.

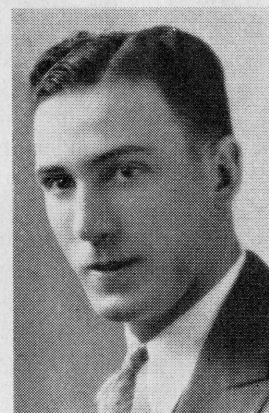
Seaton, who had coached Senn high school, Chicago, successfully for five years, put a team in the field in the annual Big Ten outdoor meet which won the championship.

Coach Seaton was a high school athlete at El Paso, Ill., graduating in athletic coaching and physical education from Illinois in 1925. He was a member of the track squad three years, the hurdles being his special event. He was also a reserve player on the basketball squad one year.

After coaching Pontiac High school for three years, Seaton went to Senn in 1928.

His track teams at Senn won 12 city championships—seven senior and five junior, out of a possible 20 in that time. One of his teams was third in the state interscholastic and another won the state indoor championship at Oak Park in 1931. In 1932 Senn was second in the national interscholastic meet.

All in all the record of the Senn track teams under Seaton has never been equalled in the history of the sport in any Chicago high school.

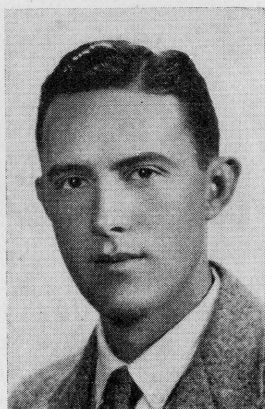

ORVAL "TOM" MARTIN, Purdue's youthful track coach, who is in his third year as the Boilermaker mentor, will always be remembered as one of the greatest all-around distance and middle distance runners ever developed in the Big Ten.

As the outstanding member of Purdue's track squads from 1928 to 1930, Martin won eight Big Ten Championships in six Big Ten Championship meets, and went through his entire collegiate career without tasting defeat in any conference titular encounter.

As a sophomore, he broke the Big Ten indoor record for the half-mile, and the following year broke the Big Ten indoor record for the mile. He scored two doubles in championship meets, winning both the half-mile and mile runs in the outdoor championships in 1929, and duplicating his triumphs in the indoor championships in 1930.

Following his graduation from Purdue in 1930, Martin journeyed to the Pacific Coast, where he gained invaluable experience as a member of the Los Angeles A.C. track squad. He succeeded Eddie O'Connor as Purdue coach two years ago, and has launched a track building program at the Boilermaker institution that has already produced results.

FRANK HILL is a native of Chicago, attending all his school from grammar school through Armour Institute

there and centering most of his activity in athletics, both as a competitor and coach in that city and its environs.

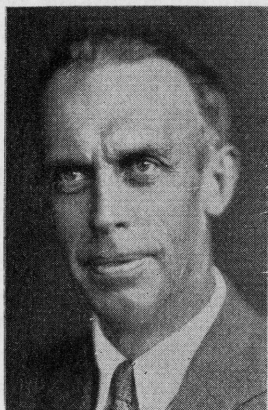
As a boy he was active in boxing and track and field work, for the Hamilton park team and later for the Cherry Circle (the C.A.A.) in Chicago.

At the outbreak of the World War, Hill was appointed track and field coach at the Great Lakes Naval Training station. He held this position during 1917 and part of 1918, when he was ordered to other duty. He coached many stars on both the track and field while at the Great Lakes station.

Hill resigned his commission as an ensign in the navy in the summer of 1921 and took over the position of Northwestern track and field coach in the fall.

During his period as coach at Northwestern, Frank Hill has put the finishing touches on many stars of the Western Conference track circles, among them Droege-mueller and Warne, pole vaulters, Alvo Martin in the middle distances and string of relay teams that have run with the best in college athletics.

NED MERRIAM was appointed track coach of the University of Chicago team in January, 1929, by Director A. A. Stagg. The latter had been the oldest coach in point of service in the country, having been in charge of the Chicago track squad since 1896, except for 1913, when he was ill. Merriam had been assistant track coach from January, 1928.

Merriam competed for the Maroons in 1906, 1907 and 1908, and was a member of the American Olympic team in 1908. He won the conference 440 yard championship all three seasons, his times being 0:50; 0:51; 0:50 2/5 respectively. In 1907 he won the conference 220 yard low hurdles in 0:25 2/5, and repeated the next season in the same time.

Following his graduation from Chicago, he was recommended by Mr. Stagg to Ames, where he was a highly successful coach from 1909 to 1923. He then was coach at DePauw for a year, resigning to become assistant coach at Yale, where he remained two seasons. He retired to direct a stock and dairy farm he owns at Lake Geneva, Wis., returning to coaching in the winter of 1928 as Mr. Stagg's assistant. He also coaches the cross-country squad.

SOME 20 points in twenty years of Western Conference track and field title meets were scored by University of Iowa athletes up to 1920 . . . no national championships were won and no Olympic team members developed.

Then, in 1921, came George Thomas Bresnahan as head coach, and now, in his fifteenth year at the university, the following Hawkeye achievements are in the records:

. . . Nine men placed on American Olympic teams (1924, 1928, 1932) with George Saling winning the 110-meter hurdles and setting Olympic record in 1932 as Edward Gordon took the broad jump

. . . Five men won total of nine National Collegiate A.A. titles

. . . Eighteen men won total of 31 clear Western conference championships; 4 others shared 5 titles

. . . Four men won five National A.A.U. senior titles

. . . High ranking of Iowa teams in National Collegiate A.A. meets—from third to sixth in eight meets

. . . Elevated positions in Western conference meets; outdoors, from second to fifth in 11 of 14 meets; indoors, record includes two championships

. . . World's, national, or conference records held at various times by Iowa men in 220-yard dash, 440-yard dash, 120-yard high hurdles, 220-yard low hurdles, two mile run, mile relay, pole vault, shot put and javelin throw.

. . . Numerous championships won and records set at major relay carnivals by 440, 880, mile, two mile and shuttle hurdles teams developed at Iowa by Coach Bresnahan.

The Hawkeye coach achieved international prominence in 1932 and 1933. First, he developed Saling and Gordon to Olympic championships, and, as one of the assistant coaches on the American Olympic teams, was in charge of the world's record-breaking 1600-meter relay team at Los Angeles in 1932.

Coach Bresnahan in the summer of 1933 was selected by the A.A.U. to coach and manage a seven-man American team to tour European countries. The Americans, competing in five countries of the conti-



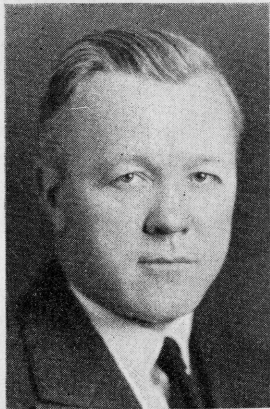

ment, won about 90 of 100 events in eleven meets during the most successful European invasion by Americans in a non-Olympic year.

Among the offices held by him are the presidency of the American Track Coaches' Association, and of the Mid-Western A.A.U.

Born in Ida Grove, Ia. in 1891, he attended high school at Sterling, Ill. and the University of Wisconsin. As an athlete at Wisconsin, he competed on three track and cross country teams which won the Western conference title.

Graduated in 1914, he was in the United States Army during the war and in 1918 returned to Wisconsin as assistant coach of track and cross country from which position he came to Iowa.

cross-country teams, has gradually brought Indiana to the top as a ranking track team in the United States.

Before coming to Indiana University in 1924, Coach Hayes served for 13 years as head track and basketball coach at Mississippi A. & M., and compiled an outstanding record there. Four men coached by him won places on the 1924 Olympic team, and in 1932, two of his more recently developed stars, Charley Hornbostel and Ivan Fugua, won places on the U. S. track squad.

Coach Hayes was born near Madison, Ind., and was graduated from Albion college in 1910. The following year he coached the Jackson, Mich., high school team to a basketball championship, and the next year went to Mississippi A. & M.

Track athletics, long dormant at Indiana when Mr. Hayes reported, showed gradual improvement and Indiana finally won five consecutive Big Ten cross country championships until the title run was abolished, and annexed the national title in 1931. First evidence of team strength came in 1932, when

Indiana for the first time in history won the Big Ten indoor meet, and went on to annex the national collegiate title the same year. Indiana again won the Big Ten indoor title in 1933 and won the championship trophy at the Butler Relays.

Coach Hayes is not a talker. He tells little of himself and devotes the most of his time to "his boys."

While in college he won letters in football, basketball and track. He served as head football coach at Indiana from 1931-33. He is friendly, yet commands respect from all. "Mister" Hayes lets his record speak for his actions.

A former student at Dartmouth, Mr. Snyder entered Ohio State University at the close of the world war in which he served as a second lieutenant pilot instructor in the Aviation corps.

At Ohio State Mr. Snyder compiled an enviable record in football and track. Prior to his graduation, he was a member of the football team in 1923 and of the track team of that year and the following two years. He captained the track teams of both 1924 and '25.

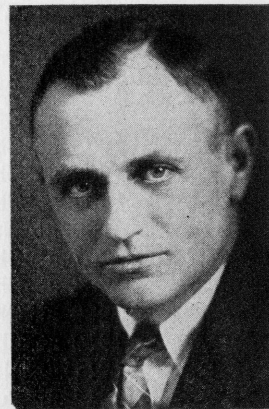
While at Ohio State he achieved national recognition in both the high and low hurdles, the high jump and the broad jump, supplementing his athletic honors by gaining the Western Conference Scholarship medal in 1925 and the same year was the recipient of the Y.M.C.A. medal offered in "recognition of his life as typical of the finest manhood on the Ohio State university campus."

Mr. Snyder, after graduation, served as assistant track coach and later as head coach. Since that time Ohio State has won its share of honors at Pennsylvania, Ohio, Cleveland and Illinois Relays. In 1929 Ohio State squad gained the National Collegiate title.

Several individual world's record holders have been turned out at the Buckeye school including George Simpson, Peter Rasmus, Richard Rockaway, Jack Keller and Jesse Owens.

"CHARLIE" HOYT came to Michigan in 1923 as Head Trainer and Freshman Track Coach, after having served at Grinnell College as Trainer and the high schools of Sioux City, Ia., as Director of Athletics. Coach Hoyt is a graduate of Grinnell College and was captain of its track team for two years. His world's record in the 220-yard event, over a curved cinder track was unkroken for many years and for years he was joint holder of the national interscholastic record in the 100-yard dash. Mr. Hoyt became Head Track Coach of the University of Michigan following the death of "Steve" Farrell in 1931 and his record in

this capacity has been brilliant. Each year since Hoyt took charge of the Wolverines his team has won either the Big Ten Indoor or Outdoor Championship and he has come to be regarded as one of the nation's outstanding trainers and teachers of trackmen.

TOM JONES is Wisconsin's oldest athletic coach, in terms of continuous service here, having first become associated with the Badger athletic department as track coach in the fall of 1912, the position he has held ever since, also carrying the duties of acting director of athletics for several years, in the interim between the resignation of George Ehler and election of the present director.

Thomas E. Jones is a native of Iowa and after his graduation from Iowa State Teachers' college, where he took part in all sports, Tom served for three years as principal of the Algona, Ia., high school. Here he coached football, basketball and track and found that portion of the work so much to his taste that he decided to make physical education, not teaching, his life work.

Further to qualify himself, he entered the Springfield, Mass., College of Physical Education, from which he was graduated two years later. He served there a year as an assistant in charge of track athletics, then came to Madison as supervisor of physical education in the schools. Here he taught seven classes daily in the high school, coached Madison high school football, basketball and track teams, planned grade school sports programs and held weekly meetings with the grade teachers. Outside of that—his time was all his own.

Naturally, when he was offered a desirable position at the University of Missouri, Tom grabbed it. He knew he could not work any more hours and it was a promotion to be a varsity track and cross country coach and assistant in football. For the first semester, pending the arrival of Chester Brewer, he was acting director of athletics at Missouri.

Two years later, in 1912, he was called back to Wisconsin as varsity track coach and assistant in football. Jones' record here is an open book and his successes have been more than could reasonably be asked. His track teams won the Big Ten outdoor championships in 1915 and 1916, as well as several indoor titles—the last one last March. In dual meet competition, Wisconsin under Jones has a remarkably high percentage of victories. His 1931 team also won Big Ten outdoor championship.

As a coach, Tom Jones is a master of track and field technique, with a rare gift for handling athletes. Every man who trains under him knows that in "Coach" he has an understanding, loyal friend.

Solid, substantial, dependable, loyal—that is Tom Jones, Wisconsin's track and cross country coach and one of the finest characters in the profession of which he is a distinguished member.

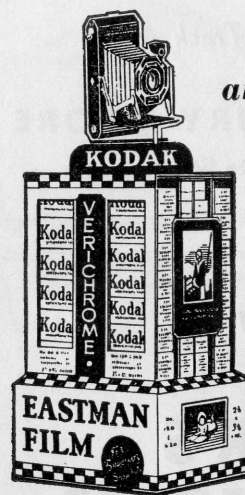

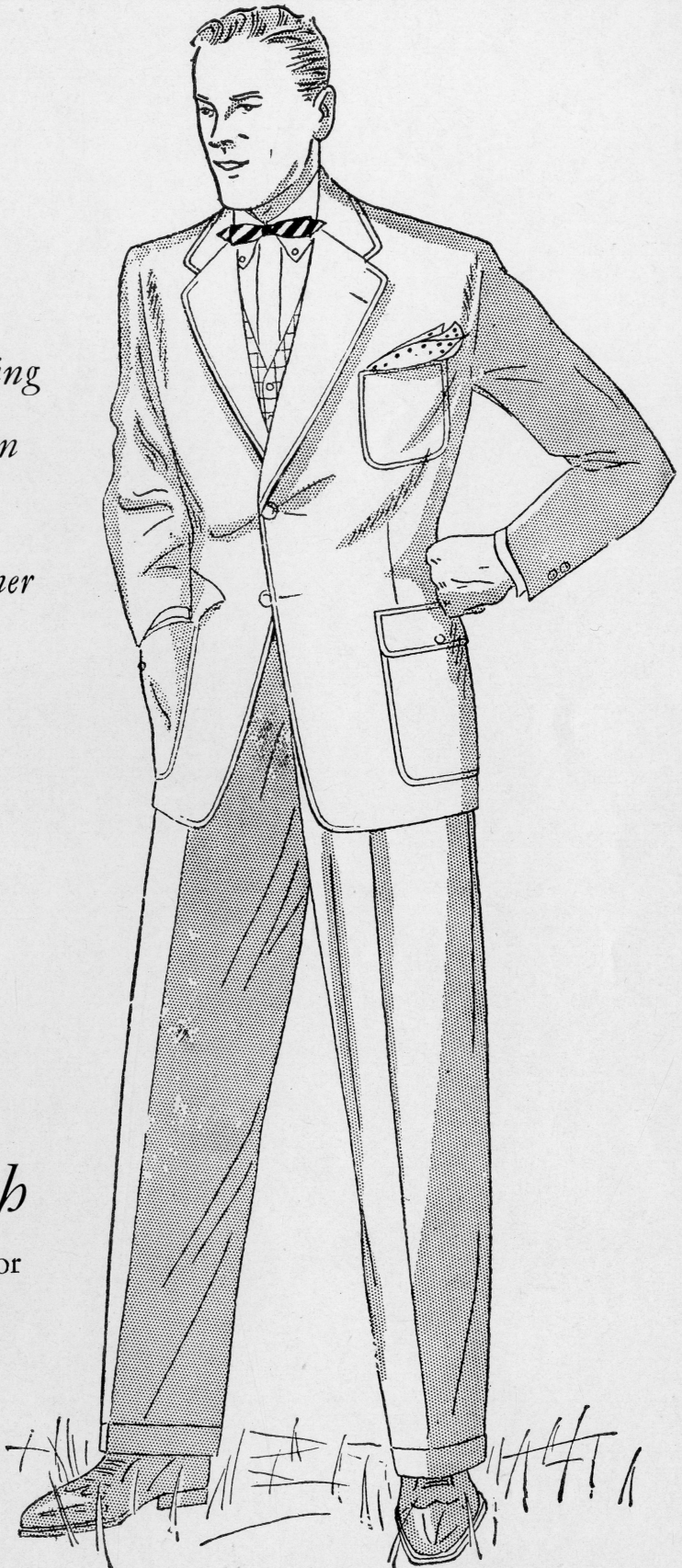

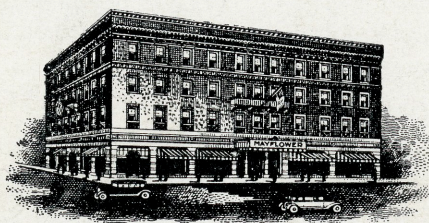
